Help shape child health research in North West London

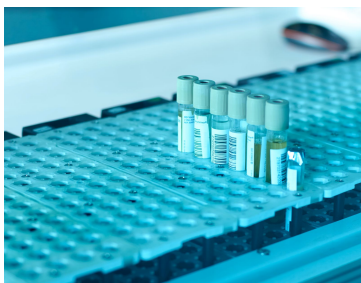
The Patient Experience Research Centre are **inviting parents and family caregivers (e.g. grandparents) who care for a child aged between 0 – 12 to complete a short survey** to help inform local child health research.

We are particularly looking for views of parents and caregivers who live or work in North West London, or whose child receives healthcare in this area.

Your responses will enable researchers and health professionals across Imperial College London, and Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust to ensure the child health research that we do has the greatest impact and relevance to local families and the community of North West London.

Have you had a late, missed or incorrect medical diagnosis?

Researchers across Imperial College, London are exploring new ways to analyse biological fluids or tissue samples (known as metabolic phenotyping) to improve disease diagnoses by identifying the most common diseases which have missed, late and/or incorrect diagnoses.

To help inform this work they are inviting individuals who have now received an accurate diagnosis for a medical condition or disease after misdiagnosis or after a prolonged period of not having a diagnosis to complete a short survey (5 minutes).

Your response will help researchers and healthcare providers to:

- understand which conditions/diseases are the most difficult to diagnose

- develop diagnostic tests to speed up diagnosis for medical conditions

Join a paid online discussion session on weight and fertility research

Join a lung cancer clinical trial advisory group

Researchers at the Cancer Research UK Imperial Centre are looking for individuals with personal experience (as a patient or carer or family member) of advanced non-small cell lung cancer to advise on a new clinical trial looking at treatment for newly diagnosed lung cancer.

As an advisory group member, you will be involved in advising on all aspects of the trial. Including supporting the research team to ensure that the design, management and undertaking of this clinical trial is relevant, acceptable and appropriate to those participating in the trial as well as wider patients, relatives and carers.

The role involves approximately 8 x half-day meetings across the 5.5 years of the trial.

This is a paid opportunity, with reimbursement provided for time involved as well as other relevant expenses.

Join a paid online discussion session on Non-Alcoholic Fatty Liver Disease (NAFLD) Research

Researchers at Imperial College, London would like to invite individuals with **lived experience of NAFLD (as a patient, carer or family member)** to join an **online patient and public discussion on Monday 6th September 2021 from 5 – 6.30pm via zoom** to hear about and share your views on NAFLD research. The researchers will be discussing three areas of research:

- Bariatric surgery and NAFLD
- The use of artificial intelligence for liver biopsies

- an opportunity to ask any questions
- an opportunity to share your views on one of three research areas above in smaller group discussions to help shape and develop this area of research.

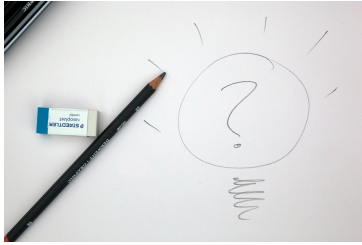
Want to learn more about public involvement in research?

Take part in NIHR's Public Involvement Feedback Survey for 2020-21

This National Institute for Health Research's (NIHR) Public Involvement Feedback Survey is now open to patients, carers, service users or members of the public involved in NIHR work and/or shaping its research over the past 18 months (since January 2020). This may include:

- as a member of a local or national advisory group
- reviewing research applications
- sitting on an NIHR funding committee
- identifying research priorities
- being a co-applicant on a NIHR funded research study
- helping design, deliver and disseminate a research project
- as a Public Research Champion
- at one of our centres, facilities, or programmes

The information collected through the survey will be used to inform policy and the future public involvement work within NIHR, and help prioritise areas for improvement.
